

# IMCS Network Strategic Plan

2024 - 2029

#### Introduction

The IMCS Network was established in 2001 following a commitment made by five countries through the Declaration of the International Conference on the International Monitoring, Control and Surveillance of Fishing Activities "Responsible Fishing Declaration". The Declaration called for the establishment of an informal Network to connect those working at the forefront of fisheries monitoring, control and surveillance (MCS), compliance and enforcement. The need to support and connect those working at the forefront of fisheries MCS, compliance and enforcement is as important today as it was over 20 years' ago.

The IMCS Network is an is an informal, voluntary organisation that supports members from national fisheries agencies and regional fisheries organisations. The IMCS Network also includes observers from intergovernmental organizations (IGOs), non-government organisations (NGOs) and academic institutions that support the objectives of the Network. We are a member-led and member-focused organisation and we exist to support the communication, collaboration, coordination and capacity development needs of our members. We believe that working collectively and collaboratively is the best way to strengthen fisheries MCS, compliance and enforcement and that these elements are essential to combat illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing and effectively support marine conservation and fisheries management objectives.

The IMCS Network Strategic Plan 2024 – 2029 provides a roadmap to guide and strengthen the Network to ensure that we deliver results, add value to the work of our members and work effectively with our observers and partners.

To strengthen and enhance fisheries MCS, compliance and enforcement by promoting and facilitating effective communication, collaboration, coordination, and capacity development across our community.

## **Implementation**

The success of the Strategic Plan relies on effective implementation by Network members, the Executive Committee and the Network team. The implementation of the Strategic Plan will be guided by an annual work plan developed by the Network team. The work plan will include outputs and activities that will deliver on the Outcome Areas and Objectives. The work plan will be developed for the calendar year and identify persons responsible, resources and timeframes.

The work plan will document all Network projects and initiatives, the selection of which will be guided by the relevance to the Outcome Areas and Objectives, benefits to members, feasibility, cost-effectiveness and impact.

A Communication Strategy will be developed to support the implementation of the Strategic Plan and to ensure we that our communications are consistent, accurate, relevant and impactful.

## **Monitoring and Evaluation**

The implementation of the Strategic Plan will be evaluated annually by the Network team and reported to the Executive Committee. The Network team will provide updates on work plan progress, potential issues and emerging opportunities to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee will be responsible for providing guidance on work plan progress and to evaluate the relevance of the Outcome Areas to ensure that progress towards the Objectives and Vision is achieved.
