

- **Economy:** Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries, Tourism





Issues

- Fisheries Office Building
- Funding;
- IUU fishing activities "unreported" fishing, data, catch;
- Implementation of Port State Measures Responsibilities;
- Limited capacity and personnel for effective MCS;
- Lack of Collaboration between line agencies (Immigration, Maritime, Customs, Ports and Harbour, Police etc..);
- Inadequate port infrastructure to accommodate fishing vessels;
- Political interference;
- Underpaid staff



Issues Cont'd

- Crewing legislation and policies
- Illiteracy (Academic and Financial)
- Run down Maritime College Facility and outdated curriculum
- Awareness on crew related matters
- Crew Agent Obligations
- Abuse of crew benefits (family members, agents, politicians, middle-man...etc)
- Repatriation costs illness, injuries even deaths
- Working conditions on fishing vessels
- Contracts and agreements

Approach

What was the approach taken to addressing the issue?

- Identify the current mechanisms (Legislation, Policies, Guidelines, SOPs etc)
- Identify bodies, government entities, stakeholders

Why did you take this approach?

- Relevant bodies or personnel work to ensure issues identified are addressed
- Avoid duplicity
- Builds confidence and morale

What was done? (Fisheries)

Vanuatu was given a yellow card in 2013 by the EU for its inability to effectively carry out MCS activities on its flag vessels heavily involved in IUU fishing activities in all the RFMOs it was a party to;

This prompted:

- Legislative and policy reforms;
- Withdrawal from IOTC and ICCAT;
- Reduction of fleet size from more than 300 to below 200 flagged fishing vessels;
- Effective participation in capacity building programs at national, regional and international level;
- Data collection compilation, storage and management processes strengthened with introduction of International Fisheries Unit;
- Strengthening of VMS regime;
- Sanctions issued to offending vessels, operators;
- Effective utilisation of observer program;
- Active RFMO participation
- Effective participation in regional MCS operations

What was done? (Maritime and Crewing)

- Established new Maritime Office Vanuatu Maritime Safety Authority (VMSA)
 - Oversees Sea Safety
 - Search and Rescue
 - Crewing
 - Seafarers Association
- Legislative and policy review
- Commission of Inquiry on management of Maritime College
- Discussions on reviewing Maritime College Syllabus and curriculum
- Crewing legislation
- Work on ratification of Cape Town Agreement, STCW-F and Convention 188

Challenges

- Still a Department;
- No office building;
- Political Interferences;
- Public Service Bureaucracy;
- Government Financial system really slow;
- IUU Fishing activities becoming sophisticated with latest drive in technology;
- Judiciary still lagging behind in fisheries and maritime related matters;
- Lacking in MCS tools, assets, equipment, funding, advance training and capacity building opportunities;
- Effective inter-agency cooperation at national, regional and international level;

Challenges Cont'd

- Crew benefits require correct information and updates to settle 2 decades long of debate;
- Maritime College needs major overhaul to be a competent institute;
- Vessel Standards Policy yet to be made to address current sub-standard conditions of vessels operating in Vanuatu's EEZ and in international waters;

Recommendations

- Government to prioritise efforts, resources and funding for fisheries, crew and maritime related matters, infrastructure, benefits, issues etc.
- More collaborative effort on inter-agency operations;

Conclusion

All mechanisms, plans, policies, guidelines, legislation, measures, instruments, have their limitations. They may be riddled with setbacks, challenges in any type or form, but should not deter one's efforts in pressing on for better outcomes. In due time, our fervent hope is that the positive outcomes, successes and achievements outweigh the challenges and negative impacts on MCS work and crew labour standards.
